perhaps...I think that could solve all of our problems about Hawaii or other extraneous types of things.

SENATOR LANDIS: All right, now knowing that it is tough to do this on the spur of the moment, let me ask one more question, Senator Elmer. In the event there was a chance between now and Select File, would you be prepared to meet with Senator Morrissey if this language needed some more refinement from your point of view, if that was accepted into the Morrissey amendment, you would be?

SENATOR ELMER: Certainly, all of us are here listening to all the transaction now, and rather than go ahead with it, I would like to see us go ahead and adopt this as an amendment to the amendment...

SENATOR LANDIS: Okay.

SENATOR ELMER: ... and then work on it between now and then if that is amenable to the people we are talking about.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, if I could ask a question of Senator Morrissey. Senator Morrissey, Senator Elmer has just read a line to add to your amendment trying to delineate what the study would be about. Recognizing that this is the first impression and maybe you want to look at this language between General File and Select File, your reaction to the addition of this language to your amendment for addition at this stage pursuant to a little more chat between stages, Senator Morrissey, your reaction?

PRESIDENT: Senator Morrissey.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: What Senator Elmer read, I would be agreeable to that, yes.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I will await. Apparently Senator Elmer is going to offer that language. I support the Elmer amendment to the amendment, and then I hope the body would by acclamation be able to support the adoption of the Morrissey amendment.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Lynch, please. The question has been called. Do I see five hands? Wait a minute. The Clerk has Senator Elmer's amendment, Senator Lynch, so we must take
