should do it on a bill that we haven't...on a bill that hasn't passed because we may do it on another bill that is yet to be passed, I think defied logic yesterday, equally defiable I think is to come back and say, since we didn't do it on a bill that hasn't passed yet because we did it on a bill that is yet to be passed yet, therefore, we neglected to do it, let's be consistent with that, I have a problem with that whole thing, if you can follow all of that. So I don't think there is any consistency anywhere. With the one example that we do have two separate issues sometimes before us, we will at some point make a final decision on Final Reading whether we would sunset as we will on Select File whether we should sunset or not and at that particular point we would have set a precedent which may dictate what we do otherwise. Other than that, I think you either agree with the sunsetting...setting, putting a hammer, as Senator Johnson, a 10-ton anvil to make sure the Legislature gets something done in this area or we agree not to do that. So, at this point, I would oppose the Warner amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Morrissey, please, followed by Senator Moore.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Mr. Speaker and members, I was going to sav something but Senator Bernard-Stevens cleared it up for me. So I will call the question.

PRESIDENT: What did you say?

SENATOR MORRISSEY: I said, since I'm not going to say anything, I will call the question.

PRESIDENT: Oh, no, you can't speak and then call the question.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: I didn't speak.

PRESIDENT: Pardon me?

PRESIDENT: Okay.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: I oppose the Warner amendment. LB 611 is something my district has really embraced as something they really think is very much needed and a very good bill. Maybe
