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everybody's in a hurry to get this done.

PRESIDENT: Well, that....

SENATOR HABERMAN: I'm not going to take the time to debate that question. But I'm going to watch the rest of the amendments, Mr. President, because if any come up on an issue that was defeated before, even at the first of the year, or any bill, I'm going to stand up here and say, hey, now wait a minute, that was defeated before and we can't address it. Is that correct?

PRESIDENT: It could be.

SENATOK HABERMAN: That's the way you're ruling?

PRESIDENT: Well, that's the way I'm ruling at the moment, I don't know what's coming up...

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, then...

PRESIDENT: ... in the future.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Any bill that comes down the pike, if any part of that bill was...I'm....Okay, thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: You're welcome. Senator Chambers, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I move to overrule the Chair.

PRESIDENT: Okay. You wish to discuss it?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And members, you'd do well to listen to this discussion. Sometimes you all get tired,...

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ... you get in a hurry, and important issues are ruled on in a way that may not be appropriate, and it becomes the precedent. Now I'm going to try to take it step by step. There are at least two items in the amendment that
