PRESIDENT: Okay. Senator Haberman...Senator Chambers, would you like to close on your motion?

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, my light was on, I did call up to ask to be recognized to speak on this issue.

PRESIDENT: Yes, you did.

SENATOR WITHEM: It was my point, so I would hope I'd have an opportunity to speak on it.

PRESIDENT: You may. I have 21 other lights on, too.

SENATOR WITHEM: Yes, and that's the reason I put in a phone call up to the Chair, to be asked specifically to be recognized to speak on this particular motion, because I assumed you did have a number of lights on. What Senator Bernard-Stevens is proposing might be the most expeditious thing to do, but I tend to agree with Senator Chambers when it comes to the rules, that interpretation of our rules are probably maybe more important than any specific item under discussion. And even though he's dead wrong on this particular issue, no, he's not dead wrong, but we have differences of opinion on this, I think it's important that we not establish a precedent just based on expediting our discussion. Senator Chambers, very rarely, is loose and free with definitions in here, but I think he was. He said a reconsideration is a discussion...is considering a motion, the same subject in the same form. You know, I defy him to find that definition in our rule book, Senator Chambers. It may be there, but I defy you to find that definition in there. What my rule book says is a reconsideration, when a question has been decided it should be in order for any member voting with the prevailing side to move for a reconsideration thereof. I would submit that the question of whether or not we should have a one-year sunset on the bill has been decided. Senator Lamb
