

to do it, if I remember correctly.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Warner, would you like to close on your amendment, please.

SENATOR WARNER: I think also the question was asked, how much more money could be appropriated to maximize all the federal money? My understanding is that 155,000 additional General Fund, or Cash Funds this year, or a maximum of 243,000 for next year would get all of the General Funds...all of the possible federal funds currently thought to be available. But again you would raise their maintenance of effort by that requirement from that point forward and have no choice to make any adjustment. So we're trying to make some increase in the programs and the services, but not going the whole thing because of the maintenance of effort.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. The question is the adoption of the Warner amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the committee amendment.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senators Rogers, Dierks and Coordsen would move to amend the bill. The amendment is on page 1853 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Rogers, are you going to handle that?

SENATOR ROGERS: Mr. President and members, the amendment, if you want to look at it, it's in...we got the page, 1853. This is an amendment to add \$150,000 for the diagnostic laboratory out to the university. I think maybe there was a little misunderstanding, from what I heard anyway, in the Appropriations Committee some of them said, well Rogers has got a pseudo rabies bill, there is an A bill on that. There is no connection between the pseudo rabies bill and this amendment. The pseudo rabies bill, that is money for the Department of Agriculture to develop an eradication program for us, this money goes out to the diagnostic lab. And one of the reasons for the increase is because of the more or less control program that we have now for pseudo rabies, they're receiving a lot more blood
