of that that I simply think that there has to be a better solution. And the solution I am going to offer because I know what is going to happen here, I think the rules will be suspended, I think the bill will be advanced, I think what we need to do is understand more what...

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR WESELY: ...are we facing, and what I think we need to do is adopt some disclosure amendment to this, not passing these barriers at this point but, instead, try and understand what is happening out there. How many children are we talking about are in this circumstance? How many minors are in need or think they need abortion? How do we get them into this situation? How is that they find themselves facing this awful choice? How do we stop that from happening? And then once they are in that situation, how do they make their decision? Do they talk to their parents? Why don't they talk to their parents if they We can find that out. We can amend this bill and ask that that sort of information be made available confidential basis, and then maybe other eyes will open as my eyes have that this world isn't perfect, as we talked about before, and there are circumstances out there we don't like to acknowledge, and that maybe, just maybe, we have got to go slow on this when I think many of us want to rush to judgment. But for a lot of reasons, ...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR WESELY: ...I am going to vote against the advancement of the bill and hope that others will as well, and not suspend the rules and consider this further.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Bernard-Stevens, please.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the body, I will just take a minute or two. It is interesting on the issue, and as I stated before, I have been in favor of parental consent and have been paradoxically supporting the bill, and I will admit it has been difficult. One of the things that I find that is interesting with the bill is that I find, in fact I haven't found anyone in the body who disagrees with the parental consent. I don't think I found anyone in the body who disagrees that a parent has the right to know and should know about things happening to their children. All the discussion
