It is time for us to move on. We only have so many days left, we have got to hurry, da-da-da-da. That argument doesn't work. This is an important enough issue that it requires every bit of minuscule look that this body can give. It requires ever bit of soul-searching the body can give.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: And I would urge us not to suspend the rules at this particular point. Thank you.
