resident and family knowledge of requirements of those facilities and their condition and the kinds of screening processes that Senator Hannibal said, and, frankly, none of us have any idea what...how far-reaching the impact of this is going to be but if you have nursing home facilities in your districts, I can assure you that OBRA is going to cause a high level of work requirements and place great difficulties on And I would simply like to point out that, at this point at least, I'm not prepared to usurp the power of the director of although I think Senator Peterson has raised some issues that we should talk about and Senator Hartnett was just visiting with me about some of the decisions that are made about where you send people, particularly out of Sarpy County, and I think we need to look at that. But I would suggest, at this point, that if you are convinced that we should take that action right now and override the direction of the agency, which I would not recommend doing right now, and I decided, frankly, I didn't have good enough grasp of this situation myself to decide to override what the recommendations of the agency were. But if you decide that you do and that you want to do that, the only way that you can do this and not put great stress and real problems on your own area and on your own nursing homes is to put new money in here rather than to accomplish this shift. And I would strongly suggest that if you signed onto this expressing concerns that Senator Peterson is raising that you might be wise to not support this particular amendment and rethink that again and decide if you want to, in fact, support him on a subsequent amendment to actually add new money in because to do otherwise I think you're going to create some real problems out there for all of us in all parts of the state that are going to have to comply with OBRA and that's where this money is going to come out of. It's going to come out of your areas. It's going to have an effect on probably the ability of your nursing homes to comply with OBRA requirements. And let me also point out that the way the budget is currently structured we're probably going to lose a rather substantial amount of federal funds if we shift this money as well. And so I think the proper course of action here today would be to reject this particular amendment and discuss this issue around the basis of is the emergency right now so critical that we should put new money into this and, in fact, override the decision of DPI? I really think that's the proper way to frame this question rather than to accomplish this shift, because to do this shift you're going to cause some unintended negative consequences for nursing homes and the compliances all over the state and cost us a significant amount
