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generally move in spiralling actions, but I'm not going to say that kind of thing on the floor, but I think that's the problem. That agency does have PR problems in rural Nebraska. Maybe they've got PR problems in Lincoln and Omaha too, but I think the place to begin with this is to start strengthening those small communities, put some money in place that helps them help themselves and not make them dependent on somebody that's going to move out there and stay for a while and be gone. I'm going to give a little time to Senator Korshoj. He said he had some remarks he wanted to make. I would support Senator Haberman's amendment. I like my amendment which would follow even better if you want to do field offices because it puts it out there really where the small towns are, but I really think the best idea of all is what Senator Baack is proposing. Senator Korshoj.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. President and members, how much time do I have?

PRESIDENT: Two minutes, not quite.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Senator Hartnett, could I ask you a couple of questions, please? Quickly, quickly. How many miles is it from your home to Norfolk?

SENATOR HARTNETT: It is 120.5 miles. I'm a little further away than Senator Hefner from...

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Okay, how far from Lincoln?

SENATOR HARTNETT: Fifty-eight.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Thank you, get away. Senator Hefner said it's no problem for the district to drive to Norfolk, 60, 70 miles. Here's an example that he is a little further than that. I don't know why the people in that district haven't called Hefner and Schellpeper. They've called me. They said we don't want the office, we don't want the office, what's it for? So I asked the director of the department and he said, well, coordination will be the eyes and ears of the district. So I give them that message and I'll summarize...I
