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research but no students.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Okay. What will it do...what will the repairs do to the appearance of the building. I understand it was supposed to be a very architecturally pleasing building. What will the repairs do to the appearance of the building?

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: The way I understand what they are trying to do is to put additional exterior columns in the same kind of facade that they have now, so it will keep the same exterior appearance. It will have, I believe, four...six more upright columns on the outside so it will look the same, have some additional upright columns, so supposedly it would be very esthetically pleasing.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Okay. One more question relative to the firm that was involved at the...probably at the construction site in Omaha which is also involved with the construction of Cushing Auditorium in Kearney, has the committee made any determination as to why they would be more reliable on this project, which is substantially greater in cost than the Pharmacy College, than they were at the time they did the Pharmacy College?

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Is that a question to me, sir?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Yes, it is, Senator.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: I think it is very important that we on the floor state again, or I state, that there was never any determination by any court that the engineers, the architects, or the contractors were at fault. I would hate to have us put ourselves into a position of suggesting something that might be less than true. The courts never made that determination that anybody was at fault. With that, it is probably reasonable to say you assume that they...all people involved are reputable people and there would be no reason not to contract with them on other occasions.

SENATOR SCHMIT: One more question then I am going to have to ask you, Senator Hannibal. Would you...
