SENATOR LINDSAY: At this point, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think my time is just about up, Mr. Chairman.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Yes. Senator Ashford, would you care to discuss the Chambers amendment? Senator Ashford. Senator Dierks, would you care to discuss the amendment? Thank you. Senator Bernard-Stevens, would you care to discuss the amendment? Senator Labeledz, on deck.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Just briefly, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I do believe it is a reasonable amendment to not...and I haven't agreed with all Senator Chambers' amendments that he has offered on this particular bill, but I do appreciate this particular amendment because, and I hope I am still on the right amendment. I was in conversations. I hope it hasn't changed on me. It is the part that was in the original bill that was a statute that was not declared unconstitutional, and the only reason for the repealer that we have in Senator Lindsay's amendment now is because we don't want to have anything conflicting on the books of which something has had a permanent injunction on. So we will take one off clean and have another unclean, if you wish, but nonetheless bill that would be in statutes. I think if there was not any permanent injunction on the original bill, I think Senator Lindsay would be the first one to say, and if not first, maybe the second, to say that the existing statute would be well and good, if we didn't have this permanent injunction on it. So if that'd be the case, we are simply, Senator Chambers is simply taking a portion of that, which was not in any way ruled unconstitutional, and putting that into this bill as well, and I see no inconsistency there, I see no problem there, and I think that definitely adds an improvement to the Lindsay amendment, and I would hope the body would support it, and again I would emphasize, it is a reasonable amendment to do. Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Labeledz, would you care to discuss the Chambers amendment? Thank you. Senator Korshoj, would you care to discuss the amendment?

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. Speaker and members, I will give most of my time to Senator Chambers. When we were talking about the pharmacy building, I made a statement that the Redcoats couldn't understand. I said twice that we were beating a dead horse to
