SENATOR LAMB: I am not sure I understand your question. If your question is...

SENATOR WARNER: I think it is more of a rhetorical question, come to think of it.

SENATOR LAMB: Oh, okay, those are easy.

SENATOR WARNER: Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, I rise to oppose the bracket motion. I think that we should go ahead and bring this bill back and then adopt the amendment and readvance it. This is just a stopgap measure, a one year only, but at least it is a start.
