SENATOR CHAMBERS: There are certain segments of the public that do pay taxes that will not be benefited by this bill, is that correct?

SENATOR HALL: That's correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then it doesn't benefit the whole public good but a segment of the public good.

SENATOR HALL: It doesn't say the whole public good, it's just says public.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It benefits a segment...it is good for a segment...

SENATOR HALL: The vast majority.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is good for a....I'll ask the questions. It is good for a segment of the taxpaying public.

SENATOR HALL: The property taxpaying public, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And certain classifications of personal property taxpayers.

SENATOR HALL: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And those who do not gain anything, what is the benefit they derive from this bill?

SENATOR HALL: That when they do own property they will have a reduction in their property taxes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, I'm saying those that don't own property and gain no benefit from this bill, what is the good that this bill does them?

SENATOR HALL: They have that to lock forward to, Senator Chambers, that's my point, that they have that to look forward to down the road, if they are to be property owners, I guess, in the future. But directly, are you asking what direct benefit do they have?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.
