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SENATOR HALL: None.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, and as far as down the road, how far down the road is this bill supposed to be in effect?

SENATOR HALL: One year.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's....Oh, so then you tell them if you hurry up in a year and get some property and pay taxes on it, then you get \$124 or so.

SENATOR HALL: You still, too, can benefit, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hall. Members of the Legislature, Senator Withem and everybody on this floor knows that this statement is not true. And they know, or should know that when you make legislative findings you are stating things that help explain the bill, the purpose of it and the justification for it. You can make any assertion that you choose, but when you have to defend an assertion which is obviously untrue as being true then it shows how bankrupt the whole thing is. And I'll tell you what I really am offended by that Senator Withem said before he hightailed it out of here. He gave credit....But let me be factually correct first. Senator Scott Moore, may I ask you a question?

PRESIDENT: Senator Moore, please.

SENATOR MOORE: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did the Governor sign on to this agreement?

SENATOR MOORE: The entire...this amendment, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Oh, one other question. Is the Governor a member of the legislative or executive branch of government?

SENATOR MOORE: The executive branch.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I resent the....Senator Hall, I didn't ask you the question, and I'm glad that everybody didn't hear that answer. I resent the fact that my leader, I'm a "Repelican", was not given credit for having helped forge this wonderful amendment that we have before us. She gave the
