view it. As to whether there is a constitutional challenge, maybe people shouldn't be too quick to say that the challenge will not be made by a taxpayer. They might say that they don't think the challenge will succeed in having the bill struck down. But they cannot determine which taxpayer may or may not bring a challenge to this bill should it become law. And, with that, I want to ask Senator Conway...Oh, is my time up?

PRESIDENT: Not quite, one minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Conway, your bill... I mean your amendment not only strikes Senator Lamb's language but adds the severability clause?

SENATOR CONWAY: Correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't think, I don't think it makes any difference what you do on this, really.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Korshoj, please.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Question.

PRESIDENT: Question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. And the question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Debate has ceased. Senator Conway, would you like to close, please?

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Mr. President. Very quickly, I offered this resolution (sic) for a couple of reasons. There is some confusion going on right now. I strongly support LB 84. It's not a question of the particulars that are in LB 84, because I support those, I've supported them on every step along the way. I think everybody on this floor that supports 84 is respectful of the determination that was made, the work of the four individuals that brought different ideas and put them under one...in one bill to try to advance the cause of a property relief proposal this year. I also am in probably somewhat of a unique situation in this body. I represent a district that is almost absolutely exactly one-half urban and one-half rural.
