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undertaken. But in the case of these young women that we profess to be so concerned about, we're going to impinge on the doctor's judgment and put him or her in the position of saying, if I behave as the trained professional that I am,...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if I comply with the professional ethics that I swore to uphold, I would perform this abortion which is a legal procedure, but because to do so would make me a criminal in the State of Nebraska, I cannot do it. So you create horns of a moral and professional dilemma. To obey the law is to be professionally unethical. To comport or comply with ethical requirements and professional standards, you must become a criminal. That's what a dilemma is. You're not allowed an alternative which does not carry severe or unwanted consequences. And if we adopt this amendment that Senator Lindsay is proposing to us, you are creating the very thing that I have described. But I know I'm talking to the wind. There is no interest in the welfare of these young women but, because there is a charge to keep that I have, I am going to continue talking to the wind and putting things in the record and opposing those things that I think are inappropriate.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Crosby, please. Senator Labeledz, please.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. And the question is, shall debate cease? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Senator Ashford...

SENATOR ASHFORD: There has only been one speaker on this...or I believe one for and one against, I think we need a little more discussion, don't we?

PRESIDENT: Senator Labeledz withdraws her motion. Go ahead, Senator Ashford. No, excuse me, Senator Ashford, yeah, go ahead, Senator Ashford, you're next.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Are there any other lights on?

PRESIDENT: Yes, there are. Beside you, there's Senator Crosby and Senator Chambers.
