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overall philosophy about the, you know, what is in the capital construction, and so forth, and I...but, you know, maybe some, I think it is in Senator Dierks' district, you know, the Atkinson Dam or, yeah, that maybe he is going to speak on that.

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Hartnett...

SENATOR HARTNETT: All I did was simply go and take what the Governor did not have, Senator.

SENATOR HEFNER: Maybe you can address some of that in your closing then, but the same way the amount of work that we are going to do on the Corrections Buildings and like that, and also the new satellite system to replace the existing microwave interconnect system, and a lot of that, and I don't think that some of us have been well enough versed on those things to know what would be a good decision or not, at least I am not. And so I am going to try and go along with the Appropriations Committee on this. Now I know that I am a little bit leery, too, of you two supporting the Governor and taking that out, and, Senator Frankie, maybe that is because you want an invitation to the opera, is that right?

SENATOR KORSHOJ: I would rather just have an invitation to the Saturday night dance.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay, okay, Saturday night dance, then. But anyway, those are my thoughts on it. I know that the Appropriation Committee has worked long and hard hours and I'd commend them for that, and I am ready to listen to hear what they have to say on these.

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR HEFNER: Thank you.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Senator Dierks.
