

at least is one biennium money, some of it goes out a little further than that. So I think it is unfortunate if you are going to try to find the money today to take it entirely, really arbitrarily, out of the capital construction budget when there are many of these that are very worthwhile. They have been on the list, not only for five years or 10 years, but in the case of the College of Business Administration, it has been on there 20 years. And so I would urge caution as we go through these, and I am very amenable to taking these vote by vote, issue by issue. I think that is fine. In fact, that is the way that I assumed that we would do it in the beginning without going through, and I think we are somewhat in a confused state now as to what we are going to vote in and what we are going to vote out, or what we are going to maintain. You are going to have to look carefully to see if the Governor funded it. If you look through the budget sheets, funded it in a different way, in many cases, than we have done, and we have attempted as Appropriations Committee, and we have attempted to do that so that the money, while we had this given amount of money now to spend, that it was done appropriately and quickly so that the "sustained" budget, the ongoing budget, could more properly be funded in a couple of three years. So I'd just I guess comment on looking at this issue with a broad perspective as we vote on these, and not arbitrarily chop something off that is going to be somewhat arbitrary. Mr. Speaker, may I ask the answer to the question now?
