

SENATOR HANNIBAL: In your book...in your budget book that we passed out last...two weeks ago, on page 15, it's this bluish cover, on page 15 there is a summary of the four capital construction projects in the Department of Corrections and the first paragraph on page 15 will explain that we're adding a 40-bed addition, opening an existing wing there and putting 40 more beds there, taking away 10 beds so we'll have a net 30-bed addition there, and that's what that \$446,000 will go towards.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So the only thing that you are aware of that the Appropriations Committee has determined to do at York is to add some more beds.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: No, that's not correct. We have added operational funding to the entire correction facility's operations. We also added per diem money in and some of that would go to increased inmate, if that's a proper term there, for their food, clothing, shelter types of things as well.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, are you aware of any training programs that will be implemented with any of those funds?

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Excuse me, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you aware of any training programs that would be implemented with those funds?

SENATOR HANNIBAL: I'm getting some help from people here to try to help me.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's all right, go ahead.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: We do have two other programs that we did address in the budget. One was dealing with correctional industries that will be partially housed there too. That's vocational training there, also we have increased the contracts for technical community colleges for vocational and technical and in some cases academic training programs. I don't have a specific number as to what goes to that particular facility.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, the reason I am concerned about this entire area of corrections is not based on the fact that something is needed in the way of construction at York, but far more is needed there than the mere
