be done. I assumed that we were finally going to address that concern and I visited with Senator Hall about this and he tells me that they did a study. He never did get the results of the study, had to request it. Finally got it and it had some inordinate amount of money that they said they needed to have in order to move a wall so they could do that. Senator Hannibal, I would like to ask you a question.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Hannibal.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Yes.

SENATOR SMITH: Has the Department of Corrections ever come to you, the Appropriations Committee, with any kind of request since the interim study that we held in Government Committee with a request for funding to help do something like that?

SENATOR HANNIBAL: Yes, but it was not part of capital construction. They actually came to us with regards to their operations budget and were asking...they phrased the problem not with capital construction but rather they said that if we had additional staff, we could have much longer visiting hours, we could use the existing space for a longer period of time. And they asked for expanded staff so that they could have longer visiting hours and it was an expansion request that, unfortunately, the Appropriations Committee did not grant.

SENATOR SMITH: They didn't ask for anything as far as extending the size of the facility itself where they...where the families meet? Would almost think that if they would do that, they wouldn't need more staff, they would be able to observe from where they're at.

SENATOR HANNIBAL: I might be able...I also was reminded that the adjustment center itself will have a separate visitation area. The current one does not. So, in effect, part of the capital construction budget here would be for an expansion of visitation facilities.

SENATOR SMITH: Well, I just couldn't help, Gary, to...when I read this to think, you know, maybe we wouldn't need a center such as this, an expanded area such as this if we did more in the area of doing some things that would up front keep them from reaching this point where they're so difficult to deal with that they have to keep them housed separately. Maybe if they were
