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happen again. I am pleased to see that the university has provided new standards so that these particular projects or lack of inspection of these particular projects will, hopefully, not happen again. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Nelson, please.

SENATOR ABOUD: I would like to have the remainder of my time go to Senator Hartnett.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hartnett. Okay, two minutes, Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President and members of the body, I think that...I haven't spoken and I passed out the paper this morning and I guess I...if I got the letter as an Omaha area senator, I didn't read it till I read it in the paper this morning and so forth. And I kind of agree with Senator Abboud, maybe we shouldn't let a professional organization kind of tell us what to...you know, what to do, and maybe they're like educators or like other people in professions, maybe farmers, that we never can agree on what, you know, what should be done, and so forth. I guess, Senator Hannibal, if I could ask you a question. I...and I did go to a meeting that Senator Goodrich arranged...

PRESIDENT: Senator Hannibal, please.

SENATOR HARTNETT: ...with the pharmacy school and people from the university, which I really appreciated Senator Goodrich doing and the people from the pharmacy school of arranging...there were people from Daly, there were people, you know, from the university staff, and so forth. My question...and you mentioned earlier in your earlier statements, Senator Hannibal, about the guarantee, and as I listened, you know, to the discussion at that time with, you know, and people from Daly were with us...

PRESIDENT: One minute.

SENATOR HARTNETT: ...and the university, was...were they going to put some...were they going to say, we, you know, our stamp, they're going to sign it? I thought they weren't going to sign off. Is that...they were sign some...a document that this when they get done will be...?
