LB 812

CLERK: (Roll call vote read. See pages 2191-92 of the Legislative Journal.) 33 ayes, 13 nays, Mr. President, on the passage of the bill with the emergency clause attached.

PRESIDENT: LB 812 passes with the emergency clause attached. May I introduce some guests, please. The call is raised. Some guests, please, in the north balcony, guests of Senator Labeledz. We have 48 fourth graders from Omaha and their teachers. They're from Ashland Park School. Will you folks please stand and be recognized. Students and teachers, please stand so we may recognize you.
