

realizes that, number one, even though I believe Senator Labeledz changed her vote, putting in position of reconsideration, that will be ruled out of order because on page 55 the rules specifically state that if a reconsideration vote has been already affirmed, which we did just a few minutes ago, vote to reconsider, that such motion to reconsider that again would be out of order. So what that means is we're going to be stuck here, or if the bill is brought up again this session, right where we are now with all the amendments and the amendments to the amendments pending. I think the body owes the body a favor by saying we are at loggerheads, we are at a parliamentary position that neither side can get an advantage right now no matter what happens, we need to move on. The discussion will carry on next session. The Supreme Court will have ruled. Lots of things happen. The issue may not even be parental notification next session. We may be fighting the ultimate question next session, we don't know. But I would urge all people to support briefly the bracket motion regardless of positions because procedurally for both sides it's the best thing to do.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The question is a motion to bracket LB 769 until January 3, 1990. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Shall the bill be bracketed? Senator Bernard-Stevens.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Again, I hope the body would simply get rid of the topic so we can move on. I ask for a roll call and first the call of the house.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Shall the house go under call? Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, please.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, to go under call.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The house is under call. Members, please record your presence. Those outside the Chamber, please return. Senator Ashford, please, would you record. Senator Labeledz, would you record your presence, please. Senator Schellpeper, please, the house is under call. Members, return to your seats for a roll call vote. The question again is the motion to bracket the bill. Mr. Clerk. would you proceed with a roll call. (Gavel.)
