

where two representatives are allowed to be on the monitoring committee and both of those representatives come from the same municipality?

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what you're trying to do with your amendment is to allow a second municipality, which is near the site, to have one of those two representatives that the municipalities send.

SENATOR DIERKS: That, or someone from the township where the site is actually located.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Right. But at any rate both representatives would not come from the single municipality.

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, if somebody can tell me why Senator Dierks' amendment is not reasonable, then I would like to hear that explanation, because it seems to me that we're spreading the representation to those who are going to be affected. I have to make a comment about what it seems we're doing or not doing. Many times the federal government will do a thing, by way of stratagem, that it could not do up front. When they wanted to build a system of interstate highways, they were not able to say that a better transportation system needs to be constructed, therefore, tax money will be used to build a system of interstate highways. They created a ruse by calling them federal system of defense and interstate highways, or national defense and interstate highways, meaning that this highway system would be used for evacuating people in the case of an attack, and you can see how effective that is if you try to get out of Lincoln after a football game on a Saturday, or if you try to get out of Omaha or in the rush hour. If it's to be...if it's to serve defense purposes by allowing the movement of military equipment and materiel, such as missiles, which they were starting to really become big on in the fifties, then you'll see that that is not a legitimate argument because the truck beds on which the missiles would be carried, once the missiles were on them, would be too high to go under the overpasses that are all...
