CLERK: Mr. President...

PRESIDENT: The call is raised.

CLERK: Senator Lamb would move to amend the bill, Mr. President. (The Lamb amendment appears on page 2379 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESITENT: Senator Lamb, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, is this AM7...amendment to...on page 10, line 24 of AM...

CLERK: Strike the word "existing".

SENATOR LAMB: Yes.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR LAMB: This is a small amendment which clarifies, I believe, the language in the bill. And if you would like to turn to your bill, it's on...it's amendment 7064 and it's on page 10, line 24. It's the last word on that page. And it strikes the word "existing" when it mentions that the facility will be built above grade lines. So you have a situation where if there is a knob or something that needs to be knocked off, it would eliminate the confusion when you're talking about existing In other words, there will have to be a grade lines. little...probably be some dirt work done and the facility, of course, is above ground structure but the language now is a bit unfortunate because it says, will be above existing grade lines. So by striking "existing" it will still be above grade but there may have to be a little dirt work done so that the existing grade lines would be changed slightly so that it, technically, would not be in conformance with the bill. So I would offer that amendment, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: You were through, Senator Lamb? Okay. Senator Schmit, please. Senator Chambers, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman, it's the little foxes that destroy the vines, I have read, and sometimes little amendments are the hardest to understand. And I'm sure Senator Lamb explained it as clearly as it could be explained but,
