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of holes, that is doing a lot of drilling. This isn't the case. But what they will be doing is the oversight of the drilling, it will assist in that oversight and review of the siting process, along with the committees, as the committees ask for this assistance. Now in the drilling process, there is a log that's kept, as they go down through there is a log kept of what is going on and it's recorded what is actually present in the kinds of materials. And also there are the corers. Now it's...if one isn't schooled in that, as the committees will not be, they need individuals to explain to them what this is and this language is saying that they will give that review of the sampling analysis, they will help with the siting and give that review and the testing that's related there and the characterization so that the committee can fully understand the general geology that exists at that site. And that is what this committee...this amendment is to do, clarification. And I request your approval of this amendment.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Schmit, please.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I support the amendment. The amendment, again, restates, as Senator Weihing has very adequately explained, that the Conservation Survey will assist without charge a local monitoring committee with oversight and review of the process. They will not engage in the sampling process on their own, will not confuse the issue but they will be available for advice and counsel without charge to the local monitoring committee. And, as such, I support the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Morrissey, please. Were you through, Senator Schmit?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Senator Morrissey, please.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Yes, Mr. President, and members, Senator Weihing, a question, please.

SENATOR WEIHING: Yes.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Your first one, Senator...

PRESIDENT: Excuse me, Senator Morrissey, would you speak more closely, can't hear you quite. Thank you.
