

SENATOR LAMB: I think...I think that's it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And I wanted it clear that I'm not going after Senator Lamb, but I like that amendment now because this is what the language says. The disposal cells of the facility shall be built above grade levels, plural. If it's above levels, it means it has to be above all of them. So whatever the highest level is, Senator Hannibal, whatever the highest level is is the one that this facility must be built above. We were having a discussion and after I thought about what Senator Hannibal told me, I came back and I read this again. So when the word is plural and we're talking about grade levels and it must be above grade levels, then it's got to be above all grade levels, all of them. So I like this amendment and I hope that it's not changed because Senator Lamb was trying to get something into the legislative history and I want to have my comments a part of the record and nothing would give me more perverse satisfaction than to see whoever wanted the amendment, in the first place, come trotting in here to strike the "s" off levels. But they have too much pride to do that. They don't want me to be right. They don't want themselves to be wrong so they will leave it as it is. And I believe that any court reading this will have to say that by the Legislature leaving that word "levels" plural, and we had been discussing undulations and differing levels of ground and surface and grades, by leaving the word plural we're talking about all of them and we've got to. So the way the bill is drafted now, there won't be any knocking off knots and knobs and bumps and bubbles. If somebody can establish that the grade was higher than what they make it when they skim it, then I think that they have got them. So I like that amendment. That's all that I'm going to say on the bill.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Hefner, followed by Senator Morrissey and Senator Schmit. Senator Morrissey, please.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: Mr. President and members, been working on the bill for a long time, many years, many people involved for many years, and everything that was done in the past was done with very little help, very little interest on the part of the people involved, i.e., the communities, the people of the state, because it was the whole state and they felt that it wouldn't be in the state. And now when it comes down to crunch time, if you will, then the people who know, first of all, that we are going to be the state and, second of all, that they are going to be
