son-in-law works with him, and neither he nor I need to be involved in this in the final analysis. There are plenty of people who know a lot about this industry who are available to help, therefore, ladies and gentlemen, I want to just say this, I hope that you will come forward and assist us in trying to work this out in the next few days. I'm going to pledge my support and my cooperation and my entire time toward that effort. Mr. President, I now ask permission to withdraw the motion for reconsideration.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. It is withdrawn. Mr. Clerk, do you have something else?

ASSISTANT CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is from Senator Schmit. Senator, this is AM1860. (Schmit AM1860 is on pages 2420-21 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit, please. 1860.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, members, this amendment shifts \$50,000 for the local monitoring committee from the first year to the second year. The way the bill was drafted there was a bit of an error, and we do not need the 50,000 the first year, we need it in the second year. Sorry, in the course of the last few minutes I have mislaid my explanation of the amendment. Here it is. Thank you. But the amendment increases the '90-91 appropriation for the local monitoring committee Cash Fund from 50 to 100,000. And it makes a commensurate reduction in '89-90. It's a correction, and I'd be glad to answer any questions.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion? Senator Dierks, please.

SENATOR DIERKS: Mr. President, members of the body, it occurs to me yesterday, when I presented an amendment and didn't have it passed around, that I was severely chastised. I wonder if Senator Schmit could give us a copy of this amendment.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Senator Dierks, just trying to give you \$50,000 in the proper manner. So, be glad to also give you a copy of the paper.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion? Senator Dierks, were you through? Were you finished?
