

university policy can be set with Kearney as part of that system. We have then indicated that merely moving the Kearney in, from one institution to another, does not complete the shift. There are a lot of other things that need to be done to facilitate that move. One of those is obviously to look at tuition. Obviously, if it is a university, and universities are more expensive to operate, then the tuition ought to be higher. We don't know who they ought to be compared with, I don't yet, and I know Senator Moore's 90 percent of UN-L, 15 percent of Harvard, minus Yale, add Oxford to that, you know, I don't know what the standard is, but Senator Moore seems to think we should add a particular standard in here. He also...I guess I would say that there are probably 100 different specifics that are going to have to be addressed when Kearney becomes a university, tuition is just one of them. We might as well also add an amendment talking about the colors of the football team at Kearney and who they schedule. Senator Baack likes that, I shouldn't have mentioned that, he'll probably have an amendment to do that here in a minute or two. We might as well talk about their role and mission and what kind of classes they can offer and what kind of classes they can't offer. These are all of the specifics that are going to have to be worked out. And I think the message is clear, Senator Moore, you've made the message and reminded us often enough that one of those questions that will have to be addressed is tuition. And by raising that on this floor, I think you've guaranteed that there will be a strong look at the tuition issue at Kearney. But to put that specific into the bill, while ignoring the other specifics, which I think we have to do, we cannot write on the floor of this Legislature, particularly with a Final Reading amendment to the bill, the...exactly what the Kearney State program is going to look like. We cannot write their student handbook on the floor here, and I think that might be what you are trying to do by addressing the tuition issue. I would ask you not to support Senator Moore's motion.
