SENATOR KRISTENSEN: You pride yourself on being fair, I assume.

SENATOR MOORE: Well, some days more than others I guess. (Laughter.)

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And...well, I think that's becoming increasingly obvious. (Laughter.) Senator Moore, don't you think that it would be fair that if you're going to raise the tuition rates for the University of Nebraska at Kearney to 90 percent of the University of Nebraska, by 1993, that you should also raise their General Fund allocations to 90 percent of the University of Nebraska by 1993 as well?

SENATOR MOORE: Yes, I think that would be fair.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: And would you bind yourself that the University of Nebraska at Kearney would get 90 percent of the UN-L budget by 1993?

SENATOR MOORE: Ninety percent of their budget?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Well, that's the way your amendment reads for their tuition.

SENATOR MOORE: You're talking about a similar Cash Fund mix, is what you're talking about.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, I'm...that's not what your amendment says. Your amendment says 90 percent of the tuition rates, and I'm asking for 90 percent of the UN-L budget by 1993 to be fair as well.

SENATOR MOORE: That would be about \$110 million, Senator Kristensen. No, I won't agree to that.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Oh. Well, I guess that's what I think probably is the logical argument to your amendment and probably deserves about that much attention. With that, members, I would urge you to defeat Senator Moore. He has made his point, and now he has brought it back to us once again. And the steer, this time, has neither eye left into it, and I don't think anyone is going to buy it, Senator Moore. Thank you.
