

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote read. See pages 2577-78 of the Legislative Journal.) 27 ayes, 19 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The amendment is adopted. The call is raised with, again, a reminder to stay as close as you possibly can through the afternoon.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have, Senator Withem, I now have...

SENATOR WITHEM: Would withdraw all of those that are numbered one through whatever number, all succeeding amendments I may have on this bill, I would withdraw at this point.

SPEAKER BARRETT: They are withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a motion, a priority motion, from Senator Lynch. Senator Lynch would move to bracket the bill until January 3, 1990.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Lynch, please.

SENATOR LYNCH: Yes, Mr. President and members, I offer this motion because it's a chance that I have to ask a senator or two some questions. It is my intention to withdraw it, so you understand that to begin with. I won't even ask the senators to ask the questions, but if the 18 million were successful I was going to ask Senator Haberman how much of your share of the 150 million, which would be the total state aid now to schools, should be used for property tax relief in your district and I was going to ask Senator Nelson what project exists in the school district that is left undone because of the need for additional school aid, and I was going to ask Senator Scotty Moore how will your district spend the additional state aid and be specific, like on LB 89. I was going to ask Elroy Hefner how much less taxes will your district payers pay because of the aid. Do you think we should know how the public spends its money and how do you think we should expect the Legislature should understand when we give people blank checks. I was going to ask Howard Lamb how do you think all taxpayers in the state should...do you think all taxpayers in the state should pay the
