

itself is so old that replacement parts are not even available. Rapid advances in the modem technology and making replacement equipment a more frequent requirement, and the quality of education suffers when such replacements do not occur. I might dare add your report that the \$9 surcharge on engineering tuition charges, during the past year, has not done anything to encourage additional enrollment in such an important area as engineering today. This, I hope, would also address many of the problems faced by not only the engineering college, but other sections as far as the accreditation goes for the continuing programs of these colleges. All of them are of extreme importance, especially one that I'm aware of in the Engineering College, for the National Science Foundation, has been checking or appraising the current situation at the University of Nebraska. Thank you, Senator Weihing, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you, Senator Johnson. I would remind also the people under the balconies that the house is not in order. Senator Warner, discussion on the motion. Senator Warner, did you want to discuss...

SENATOR WARNER: Well, Mr. President, I was just going to...this is one of these, for your information, one of these overrides that sweeps in other items. And I thought, Senator Weihing...I had the impression you were going to withdraw it. But while I'm, as long as I started talking, I might as well. This would include 2.4 million in reality for the first year, and 2.7 million the second year, that approaches 5 million dollars, actually a little over, and those kind of numbers begin to have some impact. What I really was thinking about saying, you know I remember Governors who sent back budget messages, budget vetoes rather without any identification of what reasons it was taken out, it was just 100,000 here and a million there, and seldom did it identify what...how that figure was arrived at. Then you'd sit out here and we would be in the position of arguing to override a veto without pinpointing what it was, because the response always was, they can reallocate, the agency can reallocate and whatever the item is all you have to do is reallocate and do it. Now the Governor has given us a basis for her vetoes, and we tend to attack that. The fact still remains within the realm of flexibility that any agency has, and I'm not talking about the university necessarily, the fact remains that some things that we override, if it's a high priority it could perhaps be reallocated. In other cases that is obviously not
