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divided question that the body was moving on. We had a lot of amendments pending and we all of a sudden had a suspension order to suspend the rules and all of a sudden in order to get to that right away, because people thought they had the votes, then Senator Lindsay, properly so according to the Chair, withdraw all of the divided questions so we could get to the strategic vote that at that point didn't pass anyway. And I think that those...it's those type of things that we, as a body, need to be very, very careful of. So I appreciate Senator Chambers' change and I thank him for his time.

PRESIDENT: Okay. Senator Owen Elmer, please.

SENATOR ELMER: Thank you, Mr. President. Could I ask Senator Lynch or the Clerk a question about...

PRESIDENT: Yes. Which one would you like to ask?

SENATOR ELMER: Senator Lynch.

PRESIDENT: Senator Lynch, please.

SENATOR ELMER: If, during the debate, we are working on a divided question and say it's divided into four parts and three parts of the question that's been divided have been adopted by the body, and then the fourth part comes and is rejected, can then the introducer of that amendment or that particular motion withdraw the entire portion or just that which is remaining afterward?

SENATOR LYNCH: When you say rejected, Senator Elmer, you mean already voted on, I assume,...

SENATOR ELMER: Yes.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...and voted negatively. No. Since each one...each part of the four-part division has already been voted on, acted on and approved,...

SENATOR ELMER: Well, perhaps I'll restate it.

SENATOR LYNCH: ...because they were voted on, they cannot be withdrawn.

SENATOR ELMER: You could only withdraw what has not been acted
