And I think to begin a laundry list of specifically what types of amendments may be germane and what type may not, first of all, it's a never-ending process, secondly, I don't think that particular type of amendment, the penny sales tax, the half cent sales tax, the 2 percent increase in the cigarette tax, whatever other sort of amendments may come in are necessarily any more holy or any more important to the body in bringing ... in processing its business than the type of amendments that allow the pickle card legislation to be considered along with the bingo legislation, or the ATM legislation to be considered along with the other type of vehicle legislation, or the one type of education legislation to be considered along with another kind of legislation. There really is no logical reason to include that particular type of amendment as germane when we're going to say that the rest of them are not. I would much rather see us proceed along what we appear to be proceeding along, and that is a wrestling, as a body, with what type of standards we should apply against all amendments to determine whether they are germane or not than to start hollowing out exemptions for particular types of amendments that particular members may feel that they want to offer when they don't particularly care to offer the other types of amendments. So I think once this process begins, then we begin this process of not trying to come up with a coherent view of what is germane and what isn't germane. We start then singling out special exemptions. We'll end up with a germaneness rule in here somewhat like our personal property tax situation in our state, and we all know what kind of situation that leads to. So I would urge you not to support the Moore amendment.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Moore, then Senator Hall.

SENATOR MOORE: After listening to the "eloquency" of Senator Chambers and Senator Withem, I'm convinced that I'm in error to try to make a bad amendment better in my eyes, and for that reason I withdraw the amendment and simply because of the vast amount of questions on what it is (inaudible) germaneness, urge the body to play it safe and defeat the amendment in total. Withdraw it.

PRESIDENT: Okay, it is withdrawn. We're back to the original amendment number eight. Senator Lynch, do you wish to talk about it?
