opportunity as a body, as a branch of government to consider our circumstance and consider overrides is totally irresponsible, irresponsible. Now I think this body is responsible. had a chance to override, for instance, I note that there were some vetoes that occurred and we had a chance to override last session. How many were successful, and these are on budget matters, 5 were successful, 13 were not. So just by allowing us a chance to override doesn't mean that everything is overridden. And it may end up that none of them are overridden. means is that this body cares enough about the chance to consider these measures that we give ourselves that opportunity. And I, for one, think that this circumstance, yes, there's chance to negotiate. I appreciate the Speaker has done a good job, I'm not saying that he hasn't. But it gives too much power to the Governor. When he has to go in, or whoever the Speaker is, and goes in and negotiates with the Governor they know that they've got the upper hand, and so they can have an opportunity here to do things on their terms, basically. Where this will say, no, one way or the other this Legislature is going to have the right to override. And if we can we'll negotiate to move it up a little bit. But you know that if you don't cooperate we're still going to make sure that we have that right. We preserve that prerogative. And as a Legislature we should do that. Senator Barrett talked about the long and the short session, we should only do it in the short session, because that's where the budgets are. I'm not focusing just on budgets, any bill that we have, it doesn't matter if it's a budget bill or not, any bill we have that we take the time to deal with and pass ought to have the chance, if it's vetoed, for the sponsor in this body to consider an override. So it doesn't seem to me to make any sense to say it only applies to short sessions. It should apply a universal, fundamental principle that we reserve the right override. We're the legislative branch, legislation, ...

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR WESELY: ...we pass budgets, the Governor can veto the legislation, she can veto the budgets, but then we have that last opportunity to override. It is our right and it ought to be maintained by this body. Now I think that obviously we're going to...there's talk about the pocketbook. Senator Barrett talked about the per diems and stuff. Put that aside, please. I understand the impact that you have and the time it takes and all of that. But that is not how we should be making decisions.
