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pass the bill so it gave us five days. But to me then we would just be wasting our last couple days of each and every session so that we did have them passed and we would have time again. It may also have something to do with the vetoes, that if a Governor, whoever that may be, would know that the body still had an opportunity to act upon those. And I think my point that we were severely criticized by the news media that we didn't have a backbone in the Legislature and so on, Senator Warner's point, if we had that, we would have to be responsible for our actions, so I look upon this as something that is needed by the body. Thanks.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator McFarland.

SENATOR MCFARLAND: Call the question, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. That won't be necessary, there are no other lights on. Chairman Lynch, would you care to close on the adoption of proposal number ten?

SENATOR LYNCH: No, Mr. Chairman, I think it's been debated adequately.

SPEAKER BARRETT: That being the case, the question before the house is the adoption of proposal number ten. Those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on proposal number ten. Chair recognizes Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd ask for a call of the house and a roll call vote.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. Clear the board, Mr. Clerk. Members will now vote on placing themselves under call. Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, please.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 18 ayes, 1 nay to go under call, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BARRETT: The house is under call. Members, please return to your seats and record your presence. Those outside the Legislative Chamber, please return. The house is under call. Senator Lynch, please. Senator Dierks, Senator Landis, please record your presence. Senator McFarland, please. Senator Pirsch. Senator Weihing, please. Senator Hartnett, would you please check in. Senator Robak, Senator Dennis Byars,
