SENATOR HABERMAN: Oh, I see, this is not a committee amendment?

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: No.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, I will wait until we get...Mr. President, I will wait until we get on the amendments, please, or on the bill.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you, sir. Mr. Clerk, have you an amendment on the desk?

CLERK: Mr. President, I do. Senator Johnson, you had an amendment printed last year. Senator, you had...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Johnson.

CLERK: You had an amendment printed last year. I assume that one is to go away.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: Yes.

CLERK: And substitute the one you gave me this year, AM1975? (See Journal page 113.)

JOHNSON: Again, Senators, the purpose is to update the language and maybe this is an area that Senator Chambers or Senator Haberman would like to talk about, but, obviously, we are dealing with a variety of technical terminology about seed, and we are just, as I said, trying to update Nebraska Seed Law to comply with RUSSL, which is a program nationally designed, and I might add that all these recommendations came from the Nebraska Seed Advisory Committee, which is made up of the seedsmen of Nebraska, and they are in agreement with all of these recommended changes. And I guess the important thing to remember here is that we are not trying to change law in a way that would be adverse to the buyer as well. We are making sure that those individuals, those seedsmen who hold themselves out
