don't just live in my district, a lot of them live in your districts, and a lot of them come to me. And they fill letters of request for help with their salt water tears because their senator has turned his or her back on them and will not respond. Maybe what I need to do is start teaching them something by telling them, go to your senator,...

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and I won't even tell you who that person is, you find out. You found me, find him or her. How do you know of me anyway? I don't live where you live, I've never been cut there, so why do you come to me? There are some of your kind who would be protected by the provision that I'm seeking to restore to this provision...this proposal that is before us now. And we need to begin to think what the ultimate ramifications are and not just listen to the lobbyists for the Supreme Court and the Bar Association out there in that Rotunda, because today is not the end. There are additional days. But I hope that you will vote to restore this provision, because it does not reinclude all of the civil cases. The court still can choose to hear or not hear those as it pleases. So I hope you will vote to reinstate...

SPEAKER BARRETT: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the felony cases as the ones that will have a right, under the Constitution, to an appeal to the Supreme Court itself.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Thank you. You've heard the closing. And the question is the adoption of the Chambers amendment to LR 8. Those in favor of that motion please vote aye, opposed nay. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Remarks inaudible.)

SPEAKER BARRETT: Call of the house has been requested. Shall the house go under call? Those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 13 ayes, 1 may to go under call, Mr. President.
