

we're going to make sure of that by changing the Constitution so that you will be denied that right that you now have. The Legislature can do anything it wants to in terms of cutting off your access to the Supreme Court. But what I want to do with this amendment is get us all on record, with a record vote, as being opposed to the laboring community having a right to take their problems to the Supreme Court. That's what I want. And I know that there is not much clout that labor has in this state. But what little they do have I think they ought to put that in the direction of trying to get the things they think are important. And there might be people connected with labor organizations who want to be in good with judges and others and who are more detrimental to the rights of the people they supposedly represent than management. In some cases there is a greater affinity between management and the top level people in labor unions than there is between the top people in the labor unions and the laboring people they purport to represent. But the laboring people will be able to determine that when an issue is drawn starkly enough for them to see it and really understand it. And this is one of those that I want to bring. You have no compassion for those accused of crimes, whatever the crime may be. You don't have compassion for working people, I know that. But sometimes working people have organizations and people who can raise money and impact on campaigns. And, before anybody goes, that is the end of my closing. I mean if there are no lights on, Mr. Chairman, are there any lights on?
