

Christ, I didn't know that was going to happen. They always do it. That's what they said all over the country whenever one of these things has happened, and they are not unique occurrences. This society, through its Legislature, will do things that push people against the wall, and when people react in the way we can predict they will react when pushed against the wall, we act like we don't understand it. But we calculate things and we calculatingly do those things, and then expect people not to react the way we know they're going to react, the way we know they're going to react. Right now to a lot of people on this floor this is an abstract discussion. But to other people it's a very serious matter. We've talked about things here today that are more important, as I've said earlier, than anything that we've discussed since I've been down here, because in every other area there is redress. If we pass a silly law, then we can repeal it. But in this case we're trying to amend the Constitution to take away citizens rights, and that is more serious than anything we've done before. When we've amended the Constitution in the past, it has never been the type of amendment that went across all of society and took something away that all of the citizens enjoyed. But that's what LR 8 does. And when people vote to advance this LR 8, even though a lot of them showed up as not voting on that...

SPEAKER BARRETT: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...labor union issue, their aye vote on LR 8 is an aye vote for that antilabor provision. They vote for everything that is in it. And they can't say, well, when we voted on that provision, I didn't vote. They say, yeah, but if you hadn't voted for the bill, then that one that you were not voting on could not have passed. And I want these things in the record because I deem this to be very serious. And I wish it was the kind of thing that would make everybody incensed, indignant and angry, because when that happens and people are in that frame of mind, they begin to think a little bit more about what it is that made them angry. They may not think too rationally, but at least they think about it, they're conscious of it, and it leaves an impression in their mind. Then when they settle down and the anger is gone, their better judgment comes into play, and then they, in a calm and cool manner, begin to think rationally about what it was that made them angry.
