to the committee amendments. Senator Hefner.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. President and members of the body, Senator Chambers, I'm going to support this amendment and I'm also going to support the bill. I think it's a wonderful proposition. However, I do have a question.

SPEAKER BARRETT: Senator Chambers, would you respond to a question?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will.

SENATOR HEFNER: Senator Chambers, I'm not going to badger the bill, so don't...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, that's all right, that's all right.

SENATOR HEFNER: ...so don't get too excited. But I do have a question...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That was yesterday.

SENATOR HEFNER: You said there was no opposition to the bill, and yet as I read the committee statement there was one opponent. Lienemann?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, Senator Hefner is right. There was a man, named Lienemann, who felt that these types of things should not be done for people, they ought to go out and work hard and get whatever they need and not be trying to get help in this fashion, words to that effect. So, he did appear and speak against the bill. But what I meant was that nobody on the committee voted in opposition to the bill.

SENATOR HEFNER: Okay. But this gentleman, was he opposing all scholarship programs, or don't you recall?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, Senator Hefner, he talked for a good while, and I don't want to try to reflect everything that he said or, you know, specific parts of whatever he said. But apparently it didn't have much impact on the committee or anybody else, because his views have not cropped up during the committee discussion or on the floor.
