misconception about this bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, don't deal with my misconception, if you'll just answer the question because my time will run out. What is the minimum they will be paid for the work they'll be compelled to do?

SENATOR ABBOUD: Senator Chambers, this is community service, it isn't work. I don't know where you're talk this graffiti stuff, I haven't no idea what you're talking about.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, it's not work? It's not work?

SENATOR ABBOUD: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: They won't be working then?

SENATOR ABBOUD: They'll be involved in community service.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So they won't be paid?

SENATOR ABBOUD: Like the United Way.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's the only kind of thing that, okay, so give me an idea of what they'll be doing.

SENATOR ABBOUD: They...as I said from the beginning, it's enabling legislation. It allows for these people to go either through vocational, job rehabilitation or job training or rehabilitation programs. If they choose not to do that, then they would go through, they could be involved in a community service program.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Abboud, on page 4 at the bottom of the page it says, these people should not be deemed employees of the county for any purpose. Does that mean if they're injured while working...well let me ask you, that if they're injured on one of these jobs, who will pay for the injury?

SENATOR ABBOUD: Well, they're involved in a community service. I suppose the United Way, that's who they would be involved with.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Would you be willing to put into this bill that whatever agency or group these people are working for will
