conscience' grounded in the nurture of churches." There is no simple solution and no matter what this body does or what this body may decide to do, it simply is a very, very important issue and I do support Senator Smith, anything that we can do to maybe make it better. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Smith, followed by Senator Rogers and Senator Langford.

SENATOR SMITH: I think I would just pass at this point in time and let the next person speak.

PRESIDENT: All right, thank you. Senator Rogers, please.

SENATOR ROGERS: Mr. President, and members, in regards to Senator Smith's amendment, I am not really against or for it. I guess my comment maybe would be directed to Senator Landis on his arguments for this amendment. Maybe some of you remember sometime ago in the paper, it was quoted by Senator Landis that we should get rid of a bunch of us bozos down here, so I wish you would remember that when you try to make up your mind how you are going to vote on that because I really took offense to that one, anyone of our body can call some of us a bunch of bozos. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Langford, please, followed by Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANGFORD: Mr. President, and colleagues, being one of the bozos, I wish to refute some of Senator Landis's arguments. For one thing, by the time a doctor finds out that a young woman is pregnant because of incest, that is the time the social services and the police should be brought in. That doctor should do everything in his or her power to bring proper authority in to get that child out of the house. It is already a dysfunctional family and everything should be done to help that young woman to get away from that situation. Using it as an argument against parental notification has no validity at all. Social services should be brought in, the court should be brought in, the police should be brought in. If the young woman will not do it herself, it is the duty of the doctor to find some way for it to be done. Thank you.
