have the opportunity to do what the rules say because someone else may remember that. And so, the issue here now is not, do you support the bill or not? The issue is, does he have the right to divide the rules? The rule book says he does. Yesterday the rule on the same amendment said he did. Nothing has changed since yesterday for me. So I am going to support his right irregardless of how I stand as far as supporting him, probably I don't. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Langford, you're next, but may I introduce a guest please of Senator Rogers. Under the south balcony we have Arnie Stuthman who is President of the Nebraska Pork Producers from Platte Center, Nebraska. Arnie, would you please stand and let us recognize you. Thank you for visiting us today. Senator Langford, please.

SENATOR LANGFORD: Mr. President, I'd like to call the question.

PRESIDENT: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? Senator Labedz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Point of personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: State your point.

SENATOR LABEDZ: I'd like to ask Senator Barrett, the Speaker, a question if he will yield.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barrett, would you respond to Senator Labedz's question?

SENATOR BARRETT: With some trepidation, Mr. President.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Senator Barrett. Senator Barrett, many of the senators are coming up and asking me whether or not, if we do not come to a vote on LB 769 before twelve o'clock, will you put it on...I'm on a point of order, Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: Just a moment, just a moment. Let her finish her sentence, please, and I'll recognize you.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr....(interruption)

PRESIDENT: Okay, just a moment, Senator Labedz. Senator Labedz, I do think it's kind of inappropriate to ask the Speaker
