I would just make cne point, and that is it's such a big point but we keep glossing over it and that is that the Supreme Court of the United States will make it's decision on this very law in a couple of months. It seems to me that we should try to look at the guidance that that court is going to give us and then make our decision. Why we would jump now is... just because we want to get a bill passed seems to me to be not the right thing to do, though I do understand why it is being put forth so strongly at this point.
