Senator Schimek said some of them again this morning, and one of my good feelings about Senator Schimek and I as we have been from the very beginning, in the campaign and so on, we have always been able to discuss this issue and others without getting angry at each other, and I cherish that, and I hope it continues. Yesterday, Senator Bernard-Stevens was so frustrated because none of the cons argued with him, so here I am, I'm a con arguing with you, Senator, wherever you are. But I will point out to him, and remember Mahatma Gandhi, one of the saints of our century, and his big philosophy, and it worked in India, was passive resistance, and that is what you were getting yesterday was passive resistance. You maybe didn't learn it from him but it does happen. One of the most frustrating things in marriage is when your spouse won't argue with you, he or she walks away, and he won't argue. Well, silence sometimes is worse than the vocal argument. I listened very carefully to Senator Chambers talking about the Constitution this morning because he is right about a lot of those things. He is correct on the way our Constitution was written, and one of the things that I will never thank Richard Nixon for is appointing Judge Blackman. That Roe vs. Wade, aside from anything else about it, was the most convoluted dissertation. He got into all kinds of things that really didn't have anything to do with the subject matter. The other thing that I would like to...and I have talked to Senator Chambers about this in passing sometimes, too, one of the things that really concerns me about the people who are pro-choice and work in Planned Parenthood and so on, I have a lot of friends who are of that persuasion, and I think Planned Parenthood does a lot of good things. They do a lot of good things, but one of the things I hear from them and I heard it on this floor this week and it is the mentality and the thought that is expressed that those people have too many babies.

SENATOR CROSBY: And the people they are talking about are north Omaha. They are talking about the minorities because we can't take care of them. I will say to you again, as I said the other day, if the mother forgets the baby in her womb, we should not forget that baby. We need to, and I always vote for the legislation to try to get the money to help those women take care of the babies. In any way that we can do that, we must do that. Thank you. I will turn my light on again, if I may, and talk once more. Is that allowed?
