But I think what is clear here is that we are not trampling the rights at all, and if somebody, as Senator Morrissey was alluding, has had their constitutional rights violated by an illegal search and seizure on a stop, you bet they ought to have their case thrown out, absolutely. It's wrong. It violates the Constitution, so I don't buy onto that. Again, I would renew my opposition to the Chambers amendment and would ask you to defeat it. Thank you.

SENATOR KORSHOJ: Mr. President, I yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Korshoj. Senator Kristensen, would you answer a question or two, because I don't think you hear clearly what I've been saying.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So I'm going to try to...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...get it into a form where you understand it. Tell me if this is true or false. If LR 8CA is enacted in its present form, a right that people currently have to appeal to the Supreme Court by virtue of the constitutional guarantee will be taken away.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes, true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's true, okay. Did you hear me say that farmers who will think they have an appeal to the Supreme Court will find out, if this bill takes effect, that they no longer have an appeal to the Supreme Court? Did you hear me say that?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: That and some additional, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then why do you keep indicating through your comments that I say that people will not have an appeal, period? I haven't said they can't appeal to that appellate court, so
