is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 12 ayes, 1 may to go under call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The house is under call. Will you please record your presence. Those not in the Chamber, please return to the Chamber and record your presence. Please look up to see if your light is on. We're looking for Senator Ashford, Senator Baack, Senator Beck, Senator Beyer, Senator Goodrich, Senator Haberman, Senator Hannibal, Senator Labedz, Senator Moore, Senator Peterson. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Mr. President, call in votes would be accepted.

PRESIDENT: Okay, call in votes are accepted. The question is, shall debate cease?

CLERK: Senator Wehrbein voting yes. Senator Barrett voting yes. Senator Rogers voting yes. Senator Hefner voting yes. Senator Schellpeper voting yes. Senator Abboud voting yes. Senator Beck voting yes.

PRESIDENT: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Debate has ceased. Senator Chambers, would you like to close on your motion?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, debate ceases, the curtain rings down, the door clangs on a constitutional right that citizens have had. It's a practical impossibility to obtain a successful conclusion of every effort you put forth on the floor of this Legislature especially when you give yourselves to issues of substance and that are considered controversial. This one would be considered controversial only because the courts want it, it will hurt the people, but the people don't have a lot of those on the floor today speaking in their behalf and for their rights. I think it is atrocious what is being done by the Legislature in supporting this proposed constitutional amendment especially when I hear such passionate pleas for savings and loans bailouts, bankers, Ak-Sar-Ben will have its passionate supporters. Some people are going to want to give farmers money to kill off little animals
