debate, but it doesn't matter at this point because what he is trying to do is invoke your passions and the only thing worse that he probably could have had Senator Bernard-Stevens stand up and try to divide this question to invoke your passions even further, but he didn't do that. Senator Chambers, could I ask you a couple of questions because there are parts here I truly don't understand and I'd like you to help me.

PRESIDENT: Senator...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If I'm able to help, I will. If I can't, I'll just frankly say that I'm unable to.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I appreciate your candor as always. Does this by striking lines 1 through 11, on line 7 it says, an Industrial Commission may be created for the purposes of administering such laws and appeals. If we take that out of the Constitution, do you suppose that that, in effect, is abolishing that Court of Industrial Relations?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Wait a minute, ask me again. You said an Industrial Commission may be created, if you take that out of the Constitution, yes, you would be.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: So your amendment...am I correct, and in all sincerity, this isn't a trap, in all sincerity are you doing away with the Court of Industrial Relations?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, no, no, because what I'm doing...oh, I see what you're asking me.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: See, Senator Kristensen, those lines are a whole section and they are amended by that new language, by the stricken language. So, if I simply struck that provision from LR 8...

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It would be untouched in the Constitution. I see what you were asking me.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay.
