

to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman, please.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, the bill is rather a simple bill regarding cabin trailers. According to the state patrol there is no central clearing house for identification numbers on cabin trailers and so there is no way to really check the numbers against any kind of a master list. Even in industry itself there is no uniformity as to the identification numbers. Nobody opposed the bill. It just addresses trailers. The state patrol was in favor of the bill. It says, it amends a section that the...exempts them from being inspected by the county sheriff. It says vehicles for salvage, titles being sought, vehicles who have surrendered ownership documents are a Nebraska Certificate of Title, manufacturers certificate of release of motor vehicles. It adds one more exemption to the title inspection requirements, cabin trailers. So it exempts cabin trailers from the title inspection requirement. I ask for the advancement of the bill.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Any further discussion? If not, the question is the advancement of the bill. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. We're voting on the advancement of the bill. Please vote if you care to. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the advancement of 875.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. May I please introduce some guests in the south balcony. Senator Wehrbein has 40 fourth, seventh and eighth graders from St. John the Baptist School and their teacher in Plattsmouth, Nebraska. Would you folks please stand and be recognized. Thank you for visiting us today. LB 891, please.

CLERK: Mr. President, 891 was a bill that was introduced by Senator Lowell Johnson. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 3, referred to Transportation Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill.
